**ORDINANCE NO. 2016-10 (PUBLIC HEARING)**

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 66 OF THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF  
WILLINGBORO GOVERNING RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS**

**Chapter 66 of the Code of the Township of Willingboro shall be amended and supplemented to add the following sections:**

**§66-5. Establishment of bona fide residence by new employees required.**

All non-residents appointed to positions or employment with the Township of Willingboro shall become bona fide residents of the Township within one year of their appointment or hiring and shall maintain a bona fide residence in the Township during their employment. A bona fide resident for the purpose of this section shall be a person having a permanent domicile within the Township, and one which has not been adopted with the intention of again taking up or claiming a previous residence acquired outside of the Township's boundaries.

**§66-6 Enforcement of Employee Residency Requirements.**

It shall be the duty of the Township Manager as the appointing authority to ensure that all employees hired after the effective date of this section shall become and remain bona fide residents of the Township, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:9-1.5. In the event that an employee, who is not otherwise exempt from the residency requirements, does not maintain a bona fide township residence the Township Manager shall notify that employee that failure to take up bona fide residency in the Township within 6 months of such notification will result in removal. Any employee so removed shall have the right to such appeals as are available pursuant to law.

**§66-7 Exemptions from Residency Requirements.**

This section shall not apply to any current employee of the Township who is not a resident upon final adoption of this section. Nor shall this section apply to any officer or employee who is not required by law to be a resident, where such residency requirements are otherwise provided for by ordinance or law. This section shall not apply to consultants, licensed professionals, or independent contractors who are employed, retained, or hired by the Township. For good cause shown, the Township manager may grant an exemption to any employee.

I would not have access to the Manager's Office or other locations at that are designated to be closed after hours.

WHEREAS, the Township of Willingboro has a need to acquire a 20' X 25' X18' TWO STORY CONCESSION BUILDING WITH STAIRCASE FOR THE J.F.KENNEDY CENTER as a non-fair and open contract pursuant to the provisions of *N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.4*; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to *N.J.S.A. 40A:11-3*, and Ordinance 2009-23, the Township appointed a Qualified Purchasing Agent; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to *N.J.S.A. 40A:11-3*, contracts for goods or services which do not exceed \$ 40,000.00 may be awarded by the Qualified Purchasing Agent without publicly advertising for bids; and

WHEREAS, three vendor quotes were obtained for a 20' X 25' X18' TWO STORY CONCESSION BUILDING WITH STAIRCASE FOR THE J.F.KENNEDY CENTER to include parts, labor and installation for the term of this agreement from

1. Coastal Steel submitted a cost of \$12,350.00, however, was not able to submit a complete quote providing neither a second floor nor a staircase.
2. Ironbuilt Steel Building Corporation at \$32,000.00, however, was not able to provide a complete quote to include a staircase and installation would be additional fees.
3. Eversafe, Buildings, located at 4651 Woodstock Road, Suite 208, Roswell, Georgia 30075 submitted a complete quote of \$21,880.00 to include parts, labor, and installation of a 20' X 25' X18' TWO STORY CONCESSION BUILDING WITH STAIRCASE FOR THE J.F.KENNEDY CENTER;

WHEREAS, the Qualified Purchasing Agent has determined and certified in writing that the value of the contract for a 20' X 25' X18' TWO STORY CONCESSION BUILDING WITH STAIRCASE FOR THE J.F.KENNEDY CENTER for the cost of \$21,880.00;

WHEREAS, Eversafe Buildings has submitted a proposal on July 29, 2016 indicating they will provide a 20' X 25' X18' TWO STORY CONCESSION BUILDING WITH STAIRCASE FOR THE J.F.KENNEDY CENTER for the cost \$21,880.00; and

WHEREAS, the anticipated term of this contract will expire when the contract has been fulfilled; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.5, this is a Non-Fair Open Contract, which has been certified to have an anticipated value in excess of \$17,500.00; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 19:44A-20.5 Eversafe, Buildings, located at 4651 Woodstock Road, Suite 208, Roswell, Georgia 30075 has completed and submitted a Business Entity Disclosure Certification which certifies that:

1. Eversafe, Buildings, located at 4651 Woodstock Road, Suite 208, Roswell, Georgia 30075 has not made any reportable campaign contributions in the previous 12 months to a political party or candidate committee of any person serving in elective public office in the Township of Willingboro; and

2. Eversafe, Buildings, located at 4651 Woodstock Road, Suite 208, Roswell, Georgia 30075 is prohibited from making any campaign contributions, reportable according to N.J.S.A. 19:44-1 throughout the term of the contract.

- Mayor Anderson: One of the reasons is, it allows them to broadcast and telecast. Broad cast the games from upstairs. It has windows on both sides so it can use for those doing baseball or those doing football.
- Councilman Nock: Okay, now that goes to another question. Why didn't we all know that and we all get that information? I wouldn't be asking—so, basically we will have the ability to broadcast as you say a football game. And, would you be able to do it from the ball field too?
- Deputy Mayor Walker: I think this is a great thing, because it has been a long time coming—you talk about 10, 20 years overdue. Do we have the ability to reach out to people like; Coca-Cola or other entities for sponsorships? I know other towns they reach out and they do the sponsorship and pay for certain things and it makes it a little easier. I know the School District uses it for baseball, because if we are going to be broadcasting baseball games we would reach out to them for shared services agreements. I don't want to hold it up, because again it is 20 years overdue, but we at least reach out or can we still reach out. Especially for the concession part with the beverage and food--stuff like that--just something to consider.
- Councilwoman Jennings: I agree with that. I think that is a great idea and that is something that was in the back of my mind. And, are you talking about banners or something with different names?
- Deputy Mayor Walker: Most people who do sponsorships... I know Coca-Cola will put their banner on everything, but they provide everything. Everything that they do in concession stands, they provide it. You know—Sports Paradise has a huge banner down in Fleetwood, I think it is. They are here based in Willingboro for 30 years, but sponsored down there. But, whatever we can or whoever we can get assistance from, who takes care of that? However, we can do it, let's do it. Let's just make this the best concession stand around.

- Mayor Anderson: Roll Call.
- Councilman Nock: No, I have some questions. There seems to be two things: 1. It seems to be a large disparity between, I guess it's being out from \$12,000 to \$21,000 and I am always a believer on something like this. Clearly, this is not the lowest bid, this is a no-bid that these for the different of prices that we are going to get a structure doesn't cost us issues later on and a good structure--\$21,000. What did the \$32,000 have that the \$21,000 didn't and what kind of...I just want a safe building that is not going to be a problem later on. And, 2 is since it has water and everything else and drainage---is going to have bathrooms.
- Rich Brevogel: No, it will not have a bathroom. It will have for cleaning kitchen utensils and things like that.
- Councilman Nock: So, the line to provide that is that, is that in this cost too?
- Rich Brevogel: The MUA is going to provide that line at no charge. We are coordinating with other entities to try to make...
- Mayor Anderson: Remington and Vernick are going to do the foundation, they agreed at no cost to donate, because it is going back to the kids of this community. That's what the professional are giving back.
- Councilman Nock: The point is all of us should have the information at the same time--that is what I keep saying, that we don't have this information. I don't have a problem with this. I think it is a great idea. I am just asking about the cost and about what's right-- Remington and Vernick is proving the foundation for free that's excellent. If MUA is providing the water connection, that's excellent, because they should. I am just asking now really about the safety of the building, the three bids here from \$12,000 to \$32,000 we picked the \$21,000--just want to be comfortable that it's a safe building and so forth. I mean, usually you are going to have \$10,000 differences in the same building construction.
- Rich Brevogel: I can speak with the construction official when he returns tomorrow and I can try and give you some information on the differentiation between the prices and to alleviate your fears about the structure of the building.
- Councilman Nock: Is the second floor exclusively for—maybe telecasting or press or something like that? So you won't have large numbers of individuals on the second floor.

NEW BUSINESS

Deputy Mayor Walker:

There was a concern brought up with some language to one of our contracts pertaining to Special Counsel. I want to make a motion that we amend the contract where it currently states that work sent to Special Council comes through the Township Manager and the Solicitor. Our Special Counsel asks that we add that work to them can be also referred by Council. So, I want to make a motion that we amend the contract just to read that Council can also refer work to Special Counsel; and it is just about... it is a play on words, but it is just a clarification of who can and who cannot assign work to Special Counsel. It is a simple thing, but just a matter of housekeeping. That's my motion.

Councilman Nock:

I will second that motion for the sake of conversation.

Councilwoman Jennings:

Discussion. I disagree with changing the language of a particular contract. We have had the contracts in place for eight (8) months now. And, once again this is a bias request, council should not be... We have a legal department and just because someone does not like the legal department or decisions by the legal department doesn't mean that the Council should now take on the responsibility, because none of us are lawyers that I know of—take on the responsibility of assigning contracts to any of our legal team—that is what we have a solicitor for. Why do we have a Township Solicitor if we are not allowing the Township Solicitor to do their job based on personal agendas? So, I would like to say that since we have the contract in place with everybody else, we have—special attorneys; we have Conflict Attorneys; we have Labor Attorneys and this is the first time this has come up all of a sudden—nine months into the year and there is no reason to make a change now. The Council has never been responsible for assigning legal jobs--if you will—to anybody--and we should not take on that responsibility now. We should leave that to the legal people who know what they are doing.

Mayor Anderson: Point of discussion. In regards to the concerns that is being addressed, it is nine months into the year. It is something I would not mind considering, but not nine months in. At the end of the year once we review contracts to see if we are going to make changes that are going to be consistent across the board with all the professionals, then it gives us an opportunity to say, yes, let's make change or not. It gives us a little more time to hash it out; being it has just taken place. But once again, it is nine months into the year. This contract has been in place—this form contract has been in place for the two years. So, I would be in favor of looking at it, taking more consideration at the end of the year—opposed to changing nine months in.

Councilman Holley: Motion made just a for clarification purpose, that was the majority Council consent, correct? I just want to clarify. It is on the record.

Councilman Nock: I don't know where to begin on this because this is a request by Special Counsel and this is a very unique and special situation that we are in. Is adding two words...I personally do not like to get involved in a dispute between two law firms and I am not an attorney; by adding two words to it—knowing the uniqueness of this particular situation and the fact that I have a personal opinion that our Solicitor should not have kind of—well let's put it this way, that this goes to Special Counsel and that Special Counsel gives a ruling. So, and the fact that the contract hasn't been signed—is my understanding from what was said to us. So, these are what—three words added to be—the Township Manager could call a question about things and then the majority of Council would have to call or question about things. So, I don't see the big deal in it—I said that inside. I said this is just two law firms having an issue over wording, but since that was important to our Special Counsel to bring back...the contract has not been signed. I don't see the big deal in it, really I don't, because it is going to go on anyway. So, that is just my opinion with trying to follow Council's...trying to find the solicitor's point of ...not to get into a public discourse about what is going on. They have advised us not to talk—I am trying not to talk.

Councilwoman Jennings: And, you are.

Mayor Anderson: In regards to the request and the comments you just made, Councilman Nock, are you pertaining to the ligation matter that this changed or is it going to be any and everything?

Councilman Nock: Well, I want to say not any and everything. I am just talking about this specific thing.

Mayor Anderson: That is what I need clarification on.

Councilman Nock: First, I want to say to you, I wasn't on Council two years ago. I wasn't on there last year when you guys came up with the standard form—what have you, so I wasn't on Council until January. So, therefore, I wasn't party to these documents that are one fits all and we know all—one doesn't fit all. I want to make that very clear. But I am only talking about this situation. I am not talking about the rest of them because I assume the rest of the contracts have already been signed. This has not been signed. So, I am only talking about this one because of the uniqueness of this situation that we are in.

Mayor Anderson: Okay, so, we are looking at this one contract as it relates to this matter at hand that was discussed?

Deputy Mayor Walker: No.

Councilman Nock: Yes.

Councilwoman Jennings: Yes and not only that...

Deputy Mayor Walker: No, I made the motion.

Councilman Nock: What did you make a motion on? Please review it.

Deputy Mayor Walker: Here is what I am saying--we hire Special Counsel.

Councilman Nock: Yes.

Deputy Mayor Walker: There are certain things that if our solicitor...if there is a conflict with our solicitor or if we decide as a body that we would like for Special Counsel or another attorney to work on something, we can authorize that-- that's not making a legal decision. Contrary to what was said that is not making a legal decision. There is something that can be provided to us that we can say we would like this body to handle it. So, what our Special Counsel said, the way the contract reads is the only person that can authorize Special Counsel to do work is the Solicitor or Township Manager.

Councilman Nock: No, no Township Manager.

Deputy Mayor Walker: What he is saying is that Council has the right to refer work to him. We have done it. Just like our Solicitor said, we do it, it just isn't written in the contract. So, it is just about adding it to make it clear.

Councilwoman Jennings: We do it through our Solicitor.

Mayor Anderson: But, we do it through our Solicitor.

Deputy Mayor Walker: No, okay I am not going to argue.

Councilwoman Jennings: Does anybody see a connection here?

Deputy Mayor Walker: It is not a connection.

Councilwoman Jennings: Oh, yes it is.

Mayor Anderson: I would like to have the Solicitor speak.

Deputy Mayor Walker: Call to question.

Township Solicitor: Just for clarification Mr. Walker, with respect to you, the Special Counsel actually asked for the contract to be amended to include Council and the Manager. That was his actual request was in his letter. What typically has been my experience in this over 25, 30 years; is that if your solicitor is your legal department that you rely on our attorney to analyze all the legal matters that become before your Township and the Council generally does not have that experience nor expertise to be able to review or understand how to shift or move your matters. I am proud to say, that because of that you haven't had very many legal matters. We have a great legal team here and we are able to, when the matters come in, to decide where most appropriate where they should go. Whether they should go to Foreclosure Counselor; whether it goes to your Labor Counsel, and it does take legal knowledge to do that, because sometimes facts are sensitive. Facts drive an attorney in order to understand the nature of the matter legally and Council is not equipped to understand that and that is why by law the statute directs that you have to have a solicitor. It doesn't say you may, it says that you have to have a solicitor and the point of having a solicitor is to protect you in circumstances like that so, attorneys

can do those jobs and make sure that you are protected as a Township and that's what our job is.

Township Solicitor:

Council always approves, when it comes to having a Special Counsel anything that we recommend. If something comes in and it doesn't fall in one of the specific categories like Labor, Foreclosure and Taxation, then we will bring the matter to Council and say, here's is why we think we need this matter to go to Special Counsel. Quite frankly, you did not have a Special Counsel until we suggested it, because we wanted to have somebody in place in case of any emergency, so, if you had to have someone in a special interest of the Township, they were already on board. Because we are your attorneys understood that it always left you at a disadvantage at times to have to come back, have a special meeting and try to recruit an attorney to protect an interest that maybe we did not have an expertise in that we had a conflict in. So, we need to be in that position and I can tell you. Secondly, when cases start to be presented and we are not aware of it, then who's tracking it? The comment was Special Counsel tracks himself, but that's the point of having your legal counsel. You can do what you want—all I do is give opinions, legal opinions, that's all I can do and it is up to you to follow them and I have been giving them here for seventeen years and it has always led you to the right spot. It has always got you the right place and it has kept you out of trouble. For whatever reason, we decide not to take that advice now, is beyond me.

Councilman Nock:

I would like to have the floor. It is amazing this is over three words. It is just amazing over three words.

Deputy Mayor Walker:

Exactly.

Township Solicitor:

But in the law three words can mean a whole lot.

Councilman Nock:

Hold up again...again...

Township Solicitor:

Three words can mean a whole lot.

Councilman Nock:

Words can mean a lot...

Councilwoman Jennings:

Thank you.

Councilman Nock:

But, again, I go back to my experience of five years on the School Board. When we had Special Counsel, Special Counsel came and presented what they had to the School Board. It was not reviewed by the solicitor; it was not review by anybody. It was reviewed—Special Counsel came in and gave their opinion that is why we hired him. We didn't hire them for to pay Special Counsel and then pay our solicitor to look it over and

then pay our solicitor. Again, I don't think it makes a world of difference. It is just that the Special Counsel asked for us to amend it. To amend the contract and he is only here on special projects and clearly, the way it reads at least through the email, is that only the only person who can give him directions is the solicitor and I think what if we had a problem with your law firm--that we wanted Counsel's advice on. That means we have to go through you to hire a Special Counsel to look at something on you.

- Township Solicitor: I can answer that very easily; ethically we got a problem here.
- Councilman Nock: The bottom line is, it has been enough time on this. Next year on certain circumstances, certain things, Special Counsel, Conflict Attorney or whatever we should have the ability as Council to directly engage the majority, not individually. The majority Council top engage Special Counsel for a particular issue. That is my only position, I am not... that's my only position.
- Councilwoman Jennings: What does that mean? Not individually, but a majority, does that mean the rest of us don't find out what is going on.
- Councilman Nock: Three of five.
- Deputy Mayor Walker: Just like we do any other time.
- Mayor Anderson: The question still is, does it relate to just this matter at hand that we are looking at?
- Councilman Nock: Right now I am comfortable with the matter at hand.
- Councilman Holley: The governing body decides to consult a Special Counsel on a matter, who is that directive given to Special Counsel by?
- Deputy Mayor Walker: Say that again.
- Councilman Holley: If three members of the governing body decide there is an issue that they want to consult Special Counsel on, who is the person that brings that to Special Counsel?
- Councilman Nock: Should be the Township Manager.
- Deputy Mayor Walker: We give the issue to the Township Manager and he sends it to Special Counsel.
- Councilwoman Jennings: That is so disrespectful.
- Mayor Anderson: So, once again, because I am a little slow—I just need to understand what is happening. Are we structuring this to handle this matter at hand we are currently discussing or is this going to be across the board with all contracts and all professionals? I just need that understanding.

**Public Comments:** (September 6, 2016)

Raymond Showers-59 Northgate La.

I just want to introduce myself; I am the president of the Willingboro Panthers. I would like to thank you guys also today for approving the concession stand. I have two things today that I want to say to you guys. First off, there are really good things that I see going on in this township as of right now. You can actually feel it in your body that things are getting a whole lot better. We saw the fathers today out at the high school, the football program is really growing and growing, kids are wanting to stay in town. But it is going to be a lot of hard work and we have a lot of good volunteers here tonight, but what I also need is I also talked to that Captain today; the whole thing with the police department, kids, black lives matter, all of that, listen we have a great police department here, but what I want to get across is I would love to have the police department to come out as voluntary coaches once in a while. Just to come out just so the kids can see them as a coach not a police officer. You know, nowadays kids are more scared than anything of police officers and we need to change that perception. Kids should not be scared of cops. So that is one thing that I am going to be reaching out to the Captain with. If the guys could come out maybe even twenty minutes a day or just one day a week, they come out, that would be really appreciated. Also, what I also want to do is I have been fighting for years to turn this whole football program around in this township, and it starts with our scholastics and our school –at the high school. And like I said, you see things turning around now also. Coach Everett, I think is doing a great job with the boys that he has at the high school; and he is doing a good job with coming down to the youth programs, bringing his coaching staff down, showing his face. But, I have been asking the school board for years, for years to let these kids get a night game on that game field and I have always been turned around and saying that we cannot do it there. The question that I have to you guys is why can these kids not go out there and get on this football field so we can keep a lot of these kids in this township.

Deputy Mayor Walker:

We do not run the School District.

Raymond Showers:

So, that is just a question that I want to have. I just do not think that it is a big deal. You know, I see other townships playing on their high school fields. That is just a question that I have. I would love for our kids to get an opportunity to get out there and

play on the field that they are going to be going to high school at. So that is all that I have to say.

Pat Lindsey-Harvey-Henderson La.

Okay, first I want to say that the Willingboro Public Library is going to have its 6<sup>th</sup> annual Del Payne Memorial 5K Walk/Run and Kids Fun Run on Saturday, September 24<sup>th</sup>. You can sign up at the library. Willingboro's very own Lamont Smith is going to be on hand and his foundation is sponsoring the Kids Fun Run. And I do not see the Burlington County Times here tonight. I actually was going to give them a head's up because they actually put some positive news in their newspaper about Willingboro. How about that? And they are not here tonight, so oh well. Okay, let me go to my first issue. You know I am on top of this Township Manager search thing and I really kind of confused about the residency ordinance, well, bringing it back because I always had it. I am kind of confused as to Councilman Nock, you mentioned that by statute about the Township Manager I guess living here or not living here? I am kind of confused about that, because I have been here 39 years and I have never remembered a Township Manager not being required to live here. It is too important of a job to have someone who is not living here.

Councilwoman Jennings:

We agree.

Councilman Nock:

Nobody is disagreeing with you. It is a different statute that the Township Manager comes on. Council has the ability to waive the requirement by state law.

Pat Lindsey-Harvey:

Oh okay, I was not sure what you were talking about. Okay. I hope that you do not do that.

Councilman Nock:

I do not think that anybody on this panel feels strongly that the Township Manager should not live in the town. Let us put it that way.

Pat Lindsey-Harvey:

Okay, you are eating up my time. At the Mayor's forum we were told that the Burgess Group was going to come here on August 2<sup>nd</sup> to make a report. They were not here; I would like to know why? So that is my first question. We were also told that the Township Manager would be hired soon after Labor Day. It is after Labor Day and I have not even heard about if there has been any interviews done; because Mr. Brevogel said that you got a list of four people on August 2<sup>nd</sup>, it is now September 5<sup>th</sup> and I have not heard of any interviews even being done by anybody. That is a whole wasted month, I would like to know

what that was not done? Because at the rate we are going it does not look like anybody is going to be hired before the first of the year. My other issue is, this question goes to the Township Engineer. I wanted to know, their not to exceed amount is \$80,000.00 and in 2015 they were paid an additional 350, somewhere of \$380,000.00 in additional in 2015 and then at the beginning of this year, their threshold remained the \$80,000.00 and then in January or February of one of those months they invoiced the Township for \$80,000.00; so did that deplete their not to exceed or was it added to their 2015 bill which now that would make them close to \$500,000.00 billing the Township? That is my first question there. Secondly, with all the issues that were brought up this year and last year regarding the roads and some other infrastructure issues, was that nearly 350-\$380,000.00 – how is that spent given those issues are still issues? And I will see if I have anything else...that is it. Does anybody answer questions? It seems like when I sit down my questions do not get answered and I have to yell from my seat before you go in the closed session to get an answer. So I still have time left.

Mayor Anderson:

Your questions will be answered at the next meeting. As our standard process, the Township Manager will get back to you.

Ricardo Thurston-22 Holton La.

Just a few issues that I want to talk about. First of all is safety, over in Rittenhouse I have an elderly aunt who gets disturbed over the weekends. She lives somewhere around the Radnor and Robert's Place area, and in that parking lot there are a lot of young men that gather there drinking, making a lot of noise, but she has to move out of her bedroom and go into her living room to get some sleep. She is afraid to call the police because of the fact that she is worried about retaliation. I too have been in this community 39 years and it seems like it is getting worse as far as safety concerns. Our police officers are canvassing these areas and there has been a lot of calls about that Rittenhouse area anyhow; and they should be canvassing that area especially on the weekends when these young men get together and do what they do. Second of all, the thing I want to talk about is license and inspection. I have a property that is next door to me that has been vacant 6 years now or more. For the first 3 years I cut the grass, I shoveled the snow, I took care of it because my neighbor that lived there came down with Alzheimer's and ended up being taken out of New Jersey to Cincinnati with his sisters. It got to the point where it was getting too much for me to do both that house and my house, so I reported it one day when I saw the license inspection person going around and told her about that

was no longer going to be taking care of this property and for the Township to take care of it. Well that has been two years. Has the Township even looked into this individual property to see where the people or the owner is? I am pretty sure they are paying the taxes on it, because it is not in foreclosure. The address is 18 Holton Lane. Okay? Right now there is trees growing in front of that house that are almost covering the entrance. I used to cut them down and all that. They will go in there and cut the grass, but they will not cut the trees down, they will not do anything else other than that. So there is 2 properties- that one and the next one over that has been vacant for a while and so my concern is what are we doing about these vacant properties? Especially those that are in foreclosure are we getting on these banks to make sure they turn them over they are taking care of them? I know the house that is next to me has to be inundated with rodents because when I look at the house the soffit and all that are all broken up and everything. I even tried to buy the house from my neighbor's sister, but she refused with some odd crazy amount that she did not want to do anything with the house and I was not buying it in that condition. So that is one of the things that I would like to know; and another thing is that JFK plaza. Shop n Bag has been gone out of there for almost a year or so, going on a year or more, and I see that something is coming there. But what are we doing to bring in businesses into this community? What are you doing? Because the only thing that you have, the last thing that you have done is the Town Center where Sears and them used to be at; and there is a couple of vacant properties at JFK, we need to put something in there. Thank you.

Mattie Mallory-5 Hudson Place

Good evening. I just want to correct the spelling of my name. It is Mattie M-A-T-T-I-E. It is not short for anything that is my name. And the other thing, I was reading resolution 152 and down where it says, "Council may appoint 7 or 9 individuals to the committee, at least five of which are township residents" - so the others would not be residents of the town--if we are selecting individuals for the Hall of Fame for the town? So I just need a clarification on that. That is all.

Shirley Dilworth:

Shirley Dilworth, 36 Newport Lane. I have quite a few issues that I am concerned about, but because of the lateness of time I will just talk about 2 of my favorites. The one that concerns me the most is trash removal. I think either the Public Works Department or the Township leaders need to do something about notifying residents about trash removal. Too many people in town are putting trash out 3 and 4 days before pickup. If

pickup is on Thursday, I walk around in my neighborhood on Monday, trash is at the curb for pickup. The other issue with trash pickup is too many residents are using the blue recyclable containers to put trash in and they will not pick it up. The residents leave those containers out until the next pickup cycle. So it is a problem. It is something that I really think needs to be addressed. Perhaps a letter needs to be sent out to residents. I know this information is talked about in the community news, but apparently a lot of people are not reading the community newsletter – the quarterly newsletter that comes out. And the other issue with trash is, I do not know how you are going to do it, but too many people are leaving containers out. If trash is picked up on Thursday, when you go by Saturday, Sunday those empty containers are still at the curb. Alright, so you know we need to do better about that.

Richard Brevogel:

Can I just comment on the letter? I am not quite sure what is going on and I am quite frankly a little disappointed, but there is a letter that I did draft that addresses many of your concerns as well as a copy of what the rules and regulations are relative to trash disposal. It addresses the various issues that you are talking about -- when it can be put out, it addresses that you cannot use your recycling carts for trash disposal. I am not sure, I asked a couple of residents tonight if you had gotten the letter, but the letter obviously has not gone out yet. Because I authorized it to go out and I actually signed off on it a week and a half ago. So I will find out tomorrow where my letter is, but you are getting a letter. It is going to all 11,011 homes and it should address many of the concerns that you do have ma'am.

Mattie Mallory:

Alright, because I have not received that letter yet. The other issue that I...well it is really just a question about the remodeling of Kennedy Auditorium. Is it complete and is it open for business? Because a few weeks ago, I saw in the newspaper that there was a performance; like 2 or 3 performances that were held at the Kennedy auditorium...so...? It is not open? So the article in the newspaper was wrong?

Clerk:

No I think that they...

Mattie Mallory:

Okay, that was my question. Thank you.

Marvin Copeland:

I do not live in Willingboro anymore, but I am in Maple Shade, 13 Madison Drive. But my children are down here and they go to school here in Willingboro. I moved out here about maybe 15 years ago from New York and Willingboro was a thriving place here. But from what I see over the years, business is gone. Beneficial Banks one after another are leaving. Nothing is being replaced. We lost a supermarket over here, Shop Rite. That center over there to me looks like a ghost town. You know, my concern is that, like the other gentleman said, you need to do

things to make people want to come and do business here in Willingboro. I noticed...I really came here to speak about the concession stand over at the JFK Center. I think that is a good idea. When you look at Westampton, they have a couple of fields over there – soccer, football, baseball. They have a concession building. They do have restaurants on the side. When the concession stand is closed and when those fields are not in use, those doors to the restrooms are locked. Probably do not have it in the budget, but I think it is a good idea the concession stand and have at least some kind of restroom out there. Otherwise you are going to have everybody going into the building in the JFK Center to use the bathroom. Just my opinion, I do not think that is a good idea. You know, if you are going to build a concession stand, then go the extra yard and build a restroom out there also. You know, just my opinion. My son plays on the 80 lb. Willingboro Panthers football team. My one concern is when they are out there at night and you have different ages of kids 5 to 6, 7 to 8, 9 to 10 and so on, that lighting should be better on those fields out there. Because now you have kids scrimmaging and it is getting a little dark. That is a big concern and I really think this Township is great in sports and really think you should put a little more money into building up the sports thing. You know what I mean? Willingboro is a good place. When I came out here Martin Luther King Elementary School was open, no more. When I came out here swimming pools were open. The only pool that I see is over at the Country Club. I mean, at some point you have to start...you have got to make people want to come to Willingboro to do something. I mean there is nothing big here. But at least what we are good, build on it. We are good in sports on many levels. Carl Louis used to live here. Seeing him on the Olympics, you know, and then we have to make people want to come back to Willingboro. If not to live, to do business; so my opinion is—this concession stand – even if you go over budget, when you did the school buildings you went over budget with that. We want to have a future here in this township, or otherwise we are going to keep on losing business, we are going to keep on losing people. My thing is build on what you have; and what you have here is some pretty good sports teams from what I see.

Thomas Floyd:

Thomas Floyd, 8 Buckingham Drive, here representing Concerned Citizens of Buckingham Park. August 17<sup>th</sup> my daughter was leaving her childhood friend's house as they were planning her wedding on Buttercup Lane. A pit bull and she had my granddaughter, a 1yr old in her arms, as she was coming out of the house a pit bull charged them. Thank God her friend and her fiancé stayed on the porch as she was walking to the car because it was late it was around 9:00 P.M. They grab a bunch of cans and a tire iron and made a lot of noise to chase the pit

bull off. The pit bull got like 2 feet from her. Now way she could have fought that pit bull off with her baby in her arms. They called the cops and really do appreciate the cops came right away. They went over to the house. Now the pit pull came out of a house that had no fence. They went over there and talked to residents. All during the attack, all the noisy and everything, the residents never came out of the house to get the dog. Now after the cops talked with them, we have yet even today heard anything from Animal Control or the Police Department about anything about these residents. I do appreciate the Township Manager because the next day I called him. He was very sympathetic; he told me that he would look into it. I just talked to Captain Strothers. He talked to me very good about this. But we need to really do something about dogs. I have been talking about it ever since last year. Now, 13 days later, because the wedding was, my daughter is housekeeping while they are on their honeymoon, they are supposed to come back today. She goes over to check on their house while they are away, she could not get out of her car because not 1, not 2, but 3 pit bulls came out of that same house. I got a picture of it on my phone if you do not believe me. She was able to get a picture of 2 of them because the 3<sup>rd</sup> one ran down the street; and the one thing I noticed when she took the picture because she sat in her car because she was scared to get out – she sat in the car for almost 30 minutes waiting for somebody to come get these dogs; and the pictures she sent me showed me that 2 of the dogs running across the lawn and no owner in sight. The owner of these dogs were not in sight; and you can see in the pictures these dogs did not have collars, did not have the symbols letting us know that they were registered. We have got to do something about this. As I said last time, we cannot sell our services and then lack our services protecting our people. Now I want to hear from all 5 of you what you plan on doing about this. Now I will make a couple of suggestions because some people always say you always talk but you do not have any suggestions. We can get together with your legal teams and the animal control people and the humane society and all; find out about these large dogs, they need to be enclosed. Homeowners have these large dogs and they want them, they have to enclose their properties. Or have extra liability insurance on their homes just in case somebody get attacked. Either both or one, take your pick. Now you guys are making a lot of rules telling us what we can do; now I am asking you, within 60 days you should be voting on some kind of rule that protects the citizens of this community about these what I call lockjaw dogs – Rottweilers, pit bulls, I am pretty sure a few more fit in that same category. But if you are going to sell our services, we need to have some rules in effect in this town to protect the citizens when the animal control people are not available. And so far it is cops, thank God

they came. But there are people out here shooting in our streets and that is where they need to be, finding those shooters. Thank you.

Carl Turner-86 Earnshaw La. On behalf of the Burlington County National Panhellenic Council, and in particular the Willingboro Fort Dix Maguire Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Incorporated, through Council, to Jill and her crew, we would like to congratulate them on a job well done for the jazz festival. My second issue I guess is more a clarification on a couple of the resolutions. On the road resolutions there is amounts of dollars which was voted on to be spent, however, it does not designate the roads that they are going to be spent on; and I wanted to know whether there was a reason why or what roads and the extents of the roads that are getting repaired for the amounts of moneys that you voted to do this on; and on the I guess the resurfacing; on the reconstruction which was voted down, I do not understand why the road that was basically rejected is not on here, and if Council can tell us what road that is? Thank you.

Gary Johnson-54 Gramercy La. First I would just like to make a point that bugs me on the school board occasionally. If I recall my Robert's Rules of Order correctly, call of question is kind of a colloquial expression for move to previous question which is a motion which must be made by someone who has the floor, but must be seconded and requires a two thirds vote to pass. It is not proper to just shout out call of question. Second of all, I am going to continually call for policy that has been set in place at the request of a total of 1 Township person, and that is that. Do the right this and eliminate the 4 minute limit. Another thing that has come up is we seem to be having almost like a school board, lawyers coming out of the woodwork. Is there any limit of liability for legal fees in this Council or is it just unlimited and goes anywhere? And if you could explain that one, perhaps you would do me the favor since I have had a little problem with it before, but I have been asked questions recently about something that occurred here on the board a while ago, and that is the doctrine of necessity. Could someone explain what that is, when it applies and what are the criteria for it? I would appreciate it, thank you.

Mayor Anderson: Are there any others for public comments? Seeing none, hearing none, public comments are closed.

**Council Comments**

Councilman Nock:

Because of the evening, I have got four short things. To the gentleman that asked about the concession stand, that is kind of where I was going when I asked about the bathrooms, but I figured the difference was going to be bathrooms. That is what I thought the answer would be. I too think that if you are going to do this elaborate structure you should have bathrooms for the kids there. I do not know how much it is going to double the price, it may that. But at least now the manager has at least a few dollars from the resolution that was pulled off. So if you are going to do it, do it right with bathrooms. But I did not have it. The other thing real quickly is today we have an informational session today about neighborhood lighting, lighting, we have an informational presentation from GE about how to make the lights brighter and changing the lights out, things like that. We have been on the smart city concept of trying to change our street lighting into LED's with the possibility of having WIFI for the town and then security for the police departments, so forth. We have got a presentation today from GE and Phillips. Just a presentation just to informational; and down the road we may have some others. So I want you to know there are things being worked on in the community. That is it. I am going to stop there. I have got three others, but I am going to stop there just for the sake of time.

Councilwoman Jennings:

Good evening. Thank you for coming and giving us your opinions and your suggestions actually. Mr. Floyd, I want an ordinance right away for vicious dogs. Because I do not want to be walking on the street, I do not want my children or grandchildren even...I do not want to have to worry about that happening, so I would like to have our attorney, not our special attorney, our solicitor to work on or see what other places are doing in terms of ordinances. I think this is the second time that we have had an issue or the third, an issue about dogs and pit bulls in particular. And the first instance or first 2 where the same dog and I do not think there should be a second instance of the same dog; and actually you are bringing us a second instance of the same dog. So I think that once something happens, I think that the dogs to my mind need to be removed from the community and I do not see anything else. I do not think that they are supposed to have 3 pit bulls. It is my understanding

Councilwoman Jennings:

Okay, so we need to look into that and we need to impose stiff fines and we need to get rid of the dogs. We did have a meeting today, Ms. Lindsey-Harvey. We did not have the meeting with the Burgess Group because we just received the resumes and we did not have time to look

over them before the meeting. I think we received them the day before the meeting or the night before the meeting; and so that was scheduled for today and we did get a list of some viable candidates. So we will be interviewing next week I believe; we will be doing some interviews and see where they go. Some of the people are very well qualified and we are hoping for the best. For the person that asked to have practices on the school field, those are...that is a different body. The School Board and the Council are separate entities, so they meet the second and the fourth Monday of every month. That would be a good idea to go over there and talk with them.

Mr. Johnson, it always amazes me when you come up and talk about the 4 minute...what it is called...on the time clock because we kind of adopted that from the school board. You have been on the school board for several years and they have always had the 4 minute limit; and so it just boggles my mind when you get up and talk about the 4 minute limit. I do not get it. But anyway, nobody today even went to the 4 minutes, so I think that 4 minutes is probably adequate at this time. And with regards to your question, I do not know if our Township Manager is going to put that on his list to explain to you about the doctrine of necessity. Quite frankly I would like to hear it also. And I would see also if the Manager can talk to you about limitations because that is also a very good question and I think that we gave you misinformation at a prior council meeting; and so we need to find out what we can discuss and what we cannot with regards to limitations on that. That is it for me.

Councilman Holley:

I would like to thank everyone for coming out this evening. First thing is I want to thank our public employee staff here for the jazz festival that they put on back in August. It was once again a wonderful event and I know a lot of hours and time was spent, so thank you guys for making sure that turned out to be such a great event for us and our community. Other thing I just want to talk about tonight, I had a chance browsing on Facebook today and saw that there were a lot of fathers and dads from the community that welcomed our students at the high school this morning. Unfortunately I was not able to attend due to my job obligations, but I think that was a very great event. I saw that Harry posted it, a few other people on my Facebook as well. You know, there are positive things that happen in our community. That is just one thing that was highlighted today, so if everybody picks up the torch and contributes to some of the things that we have going on...then definitely change is coming. So thank you for coming out, good night.

Councilwoman Jennings:

I am sorry.

Deputy Mayor Walker:

I think that...

- Councilwoman Jennings: I am sorry excuse, me, can I...
- Deputy Mayor Walker: Just one second. One of the things that was missed that I know a few organizations participated in which I think is a wonderful thing. Groups and organizations this past weekend that
- Clerk: Can I just ask a question? Are you using your 4 minutes?
- Deputy Mayor Walker: Who me? Yes, that is what I am supposed to do.
- Clerk: Oh, okay. Because I thought Ms. Jennings (inaudible) go right ahead.
- Deputy Mayor Walker: Okay. A few groups and organizations participated in where over 200 students in Willingboro received haircuts and hairstyles, which that is a wonderful thing. Different business owners participated in this and it is just great to see the long lines out there and the guys and the young ladies working hard to provide these haircuts and hairstyles for the students of Willingboro. As it pertains to the PAL football program, I got involved with PAL I would say 2002 and I was first approached by a young man who asked me what I knew about football; and he probably does not remember the conversation but I know a little something and he says well just watch what we do and learn and Coach Aaron – I never knew his last name until a couple of years ago because it had just always been Coach Aaron – at that time I think he was involved for about 20 years. How long have you been involved with it? Can you stand up?
- Coach Aaron: This will be my 30<sup>th</sup> season.
- Deputy Mayor Walker: This will be my 30<sup>th</sup> season volunteering with the kids and just watching him over time come out of his pocket to do things – kids not having simple things like a mouthpiece or a cleat or sock and running to the store or running to take somebody home for 30 something years; and how his son is the head coach of Willingboro Varsity and he is out there still which is a wonderful thing, Ray Showers...yeah. Ray Showers who left who probably 20 years in now or close to 20 years in; and to hear them then talk about a concession stand and different things. I know a few years ago they were able to get a scoreboard, and the scoreboard was up, then 3 or 4 years and it was not even working, so the fight to get that done. So they are making progress and I applaud and I take my hat off to you and every time I see Coach Aaron I have to shake his hand and acknowledge what he does. So it is good to see him here, I am glad I could be a part of the decision making to finally bring part

of that dream you had with this concession stand, to play. That is it, those 2 positive things, let us roll with that and keep it moving.

Councilwoman Jennings:

Mayor, may I just say one thing please?

Mayor Anderson:

Go ahead.

Councilwoman Jennings:

Thank you very much. I just wanted to share with all of our residents that today is Mr. Brevogel's anniversary, his 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary and instead of being with his wife he is here with us.

Deputy Mayor Walker:

Motion to adjournment? Can we all go home?


Mayor Anderson:


