ORDINANCE 2015—2—PUBLIC HEARING

ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS

AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK

(N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget up to 1.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Township Council of the Township of Willingboro in the County of Burlington finds it

WHEREAS, the Township Council of the Township of Willingboro in the County of Burlington finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2015 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Township Council hereby determines that a 2.0% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$613,568.22 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS, the Township Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Township Council of the Township of Willingboro in the County of Burlington, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2015 budget year, the final appropriations of the Township of Willingboro shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14, be increased by 3.5 %, amounting to \$1,073,744.39 and that the CY 2014 municipal budget for the Township of Willingboro be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Township Council of the Township of Willingboro, assembled in public session this 17th day of March, 2015, that the Municipal Budget Appropriated Limits and to Establish a Cap Bank be adopted.

Resident Gary Johnson asked for an explanation on this ordinance.

Ms. Diggs, Township Manager, said that the changes have to do with the bonds that were sold earlier this month. She said that when the bonds were sold the township received a premium. She said the bonds were sold for a rate of 2.75, which was a very good rate. She also said that they were changes that had to be made this year that was not part of the original budget. She said that \$300,000 was used from the Fund Balance because it had increased due to the sale of the bonds. She said that there was a slight change in the Reserve Fund collectible taxes that was a calculation based on the other things that happen in the budget. She said that there was also an allocation change between the municipality and the library and noted that the total stayed the same, only the calculation was changed.

TOWNSHIP OF WILLINGBORO—PUBLIC HEARING ORDINANCE NO. 2015- 3

AN ORDINANCE GOVERNING THE MAINTENANCE OF VACANT PROPERTIES IN THE TOWNSHIP OF WILLINGBORO ESTABLISHING REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS AND LEVYING A REGISTRATION FEE UPON OWNERS OF VACANT PROPERTIES TO AMEND AND SUPPLEMENT CHAPTER 272 OF THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WILLINGBORO

ARTICLE V.

272-40. Findings:

WHEREAS, the Township of Willingboro contains numerous structures that are vacant in whole or large part; and

WHEREAS, in many cases the owners and/or other responsible parties of these structures are neglectful of them, are not maintaining or securing them to an adequate standard, or restoring them to productive use; and

WHEREAS, it has been established that vacant and abandoned structures may cause severe harm to the health, safety and general welfare of the community, including diminution of neighboring property values, increase risk of fire, and potential increases in criminal activity and public health risk; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Willingboro incurs disproportionate costs in order to deal with the problems of vacant and abandoned structures, including but not limited to excessive police calls, fire calls and property inspections; and

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest for the Township of Willingboro to establish minimum standards of accountability on the owners or other responsible parties of vacant and

- <u>a.</u> After filing a registration statement or a renewal of a registration statement, the owner of any vacant property shall provide access to the Township to conduct an exterior and interior inspection of the building to determine compliance with the Township municipal code, following reasonable notice, during the period covered by the initial registration or any subsequent renewal.
- b. The registration statement shall include the name, street address, and telephone number of a natural person 21 years of age or older, designated by the owner or owners as the authorized agent, for receiving notices of code violations and for receiving process, in any court proceeding or administrative enforcement proceeding, on behalf of such owner or owners in connection with the enforcement of any applicable code. This person must maintain an office in the state of New Jersey or reside within the state of New Jersey. The statement shall also include the name of the person responsible for maintaining and securing the property, if different.
- **c.** An owner who is a natural person and who meets the requirements of this ordinance as to location of residence or office may designate him or herself as agent.
- d. By designating an authorized agent under the provisions of this section, the owner consents to receive any and all notices of code violations concerning the registered vacant property and all process in any court proceeding or administrative enforcement proceeding brought to enforce code provisions concerning the registered building by service of this notice or process of authorized agent. Any owner who has designated an authorized agent under the provisions of this section shall be deemed to consent to the continuation of the agent's designation for the purposes of this section until the owner notifies the Inspections Department of a change of authorized agent or until the owner files a new annual registration statement. The designation of an authorized agent in no way releases the owner from any requirements of this ordinance.

Fee Schedule.

The initial registration fee for each building shall be \$250. The fee for the renewal is \$500, and the fee for the second renewal is \$750. The fee for any subsequent renewal beyond the second renewal is \$1,000.

272-45 Requirements for Owners of Vacant Property.

The owner of any residential building that has become vacant property, and any person maintaining, operating, or collecting rent for any such building that has become vacant shall, within 30 days:

- a. Enclose and secure the building against unauthorized entry as provided in the applicable provisions of the code of the Township of Willingboro; and
- b. Post a sign affixed to the building indicating the name, address and telephone number of the owner, the owner's authorized agent for the purpose of service of process, and the person responsible for day-to-day supervision and management of the building, if such person is different from the owner holding title or authorized agent. The sign shall be of a size and placed in such a location so as to be legible from the nearest public street or sidewalk, whichever is nearer, but shall be no smaller than 18" x 24"; and
- c. Secure the building from unauthorized entry and maintain the sign until the building is again legally occupied or demolished or until repair or rehabilitation of the building is complete.

272-46 Violations and Penalties.

- a. Any owner who is not in full compliance with this ordinance or who otherwise violates any provision of this ordinance or the rules and regulations issued hereunder shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$500.00 and not more than \$1,000.00 for each offense. Every day that a violation continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. Fines assessed under this chapter shall be recoverable from the owner and shall be a lien on the property.
- b. For purposes of this section, the failure to provide accurate information upon the registration statement and the failure to timely file the registration statement, shall be deemed to be violations of this ordinance.

272-47

- <u>a.</u> Nothing in this Ordinance is intended to nor shall be read to conflict or prevent the Township from taking action against buildings found to be unfit for human habitations or unsafe structures as provided in applicable provisions of the Code of the Township of Willingboro. Further, any action taken under any such code provision other than the demolition of a structure shall relieve an owner from its obligations under this ordinance.
- **<u>b.</u>** This Ordinance shall take effect upon a final passage and publication and in accordance with the laws of the State of New Jersey.
- **<u>c.</u>** The provisions of this Ordinance are severable. To the extent any clause, phrase, sentence, paragraph, or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid, illegal or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.

ORDINANCE 2015—4 PUBLIC HEARING

BOND ORDINANCE **PROVIDING FOR** THE CONSTRUCTION OF AN **EMERGENCY SERVICES** BUILDING IN AND BY THE TOWNSHIP OF WILLINGBORO, IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON, NEW JERSEY, **APPROPRIATING** \$11,000,000 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$10,450,000 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE TOWNSHIP TO FINANCE PART OF THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF WILLINGBORO, IN THE COUNTY OF BURLINGTON, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The improvement described in Section 3(a) of this bond ordinance is hereby authorized to be undertaken by the Township of Willingboro, in the County of Burlington, New Jersey (the "Township") as a general improvement. For the improvement or purpose described in Section 3(a), there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$11,000,000, including the sum of \$550,000 as the down payment required by the Local Bond Law. The down payment is now available by virtue of provision for down payment or for capital improvement purposes in one or more previously adopted budgets.

- Section 2. In order to finance the cost of the improvement or purpose not covered by application of the down payment, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$10,450,000 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of the bonds, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.
- Section 3. (a) The improvement hereby authorized and the purpose for the financing of which the bonds are to be issued is the construction, equipping and furnishing of an emergency services building, including all work and materials necessary therefor and incidental thereto.
- (b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or bond anticipation notes to be issued for the improvement or purpose is as stated in Section 2 hereof.
- (c) The estimated cost of the improvement or purpose is equal to the amount of the appropriation herein made therefor.
- Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer; provided that no bond anticipation note shall mature later than one year from its date. The bond anticipation notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer. The chief financial officer shall determine all matters in connection with bond anticipation notes issued pursuant to this bond ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the bond anticipation notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of the Local Bond Law. The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the

bond anticipation notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the bond anticipation notes pursuant to this bond ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the bond anticipation notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

- Section 5. The Township hereby certifies that it has adopted a capital budget or a temporary capital budget, as applicable. The capital or temporary capital budget of the Township is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this bond ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. To the extent that the purposes authorized herein are inconsistent with the adopted capital or temporary capital budget, a revised capital or temporary capital budget has been filed with the Division of Local Government Services.
- Section 6. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:
- (a) The improvement or purpose described in Section 3(a) of this bond ordinance is not a current expense. It is an improvement or purpose that the Township may lawfully undertake as a general improvement, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefitted thereby.

- (b) The period of usefulness of the improvement or purpose within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is 30 years.
- (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Clerk, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the Township as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$10,450,000, and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.
- (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$2,000,000 for items of expense listed in and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20 is included in the estimated cost indicated herein for the purpose or improvement.
- Section 7. The Township hereby declares the intent of the Township to issue bonds or bond anticipation notes in the amount authorized in Section 2 of this bond ordinance and to use the proceeds to pay or reimburse expenditures for the costs of the purposes described in Section 3(a) of this bond ordinance. This Section 7 is a declaration of intent within the meaning and for purposes of Treasury Regulations.
- Section 8. Any grant moneys received for the purpose described in Section 3(a) hereof shall be applied either to direct payment of the cost of the improvement or to payment of the obligations issued pursuant to this bond ordinance. The amount of obligations authorized but not issued hereunder shall be reduced to the extent that such funds are so used.

Section 9. The chief financial officer of the Township is hereby authorized to prepare and to update from time to time as necessary a financial disclosure document to be distributed in connection with the sale of obligations of the Township and to execute such disclosure document on behalf of the Township. The chief financial officer is further authorized to enter into the appropriate undertaking to provide secondary market disclosure on behalf of the Township pursuant to Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the ARule@) for the benefit of holders and beneficial owners of obligations of the Township and to amend such undertaking from time to time in connection with any change in law, or interpretation thereof, provided such undertaking is and continues to be, in the opinion of a nationally recognized bond counsel, consistent with the requirements of the Rule. In the event that the Township fails to comply with its undertaking, the Township shall not be liable for any monetary damages, and the remedy shall be limited to specific performance of the undertaking.

Section 10. The full faith and credit of the Township are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Township, and the Township shall be obligated to levy *ad valorem* taxes upon all the taxable real property within the Township for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

Section 11. This bond ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.

Mr. Floyd commended our Willingboro Township Police Officers for acquiring and using body cameras. He said that they were also doing a great job of patrolling the streets.

Mr. Floyd complained that the Tot Lot area us still a mess and that no action has been taken since he last spoke about it. He said that the site still needed to be cleaned up and fixed up.

Mr. Floyd invited those present to come to the Citizens of Buckingham meetings, held every fourth (4th) Tuesday at the Good Shepherd Church at 7:30PM. He noted that it would be wonderful to also have a council member to come and let the Citizens of Buckingham know what's happening in the Township.

Barbara Washington

Ms. Washington spoke on behalf of Ms. Violet White saying that it's not fair that ReMax can come into the community, rent houses and not care about the condition of the house.

Ron Hardy

Mr. Hardy complained that the utilities poles in the back of his house was struck by lighting and then a tree limb came down and took the power line off. He said that he called PSE&G and gave them the pole number—they said that the pole did not exist. He said PSE&G did come out and put everything back in place, the cable company came out changed the wire and moved them over. He said, now the problem is that there is an orange spot sprayed on the pole for it to be condemned. He said he called and asked PSE&G who was going to take the pole down and they said its Verizon's problem.

Mr. Hardy also complained that PSE&G and Verizon trucks leave ruts on the lawn and he would like to know why he as a resident should have to deal with this. He wanted to know from Council if there was something that says that PSE&G/Verizon has to repair the resident's landscape

Gary Johnson

Mr. Johnson said that because of the great job the person with the drone did at the Millcreek Jazz fest and the fact that one of our residents was recently also flying one of them, that maybe Council should look into the use of them as well. He noted that they could possibly be a help to our Police Department and our Fire Department.

Council Comment

Deputy Mayor Anderson welcomed everyone and said that it was nice to see a full house. He mentioned that he attended a wonderful event at the new JFK Banquet facility. He noted that it was the Phenomenal Woman's Annual Event. He said that of all the women chosen that our own Township Manager, Joanne Diggs should have been among the honorees for the great job that she has done and is still doing in the Township.

Deputy Mayor Anderson also commended Willingboro's own Gregory Pardlo, who won the 2015 Pulitzer Prize for Poetry. He noted that Mr. Pardlo was also a nominee for the 46th NAACP Image Award for outstanding literature work and poetry. Deputy Mayor Anderson said that Willingboro puts out the greatest and best, not only in sports, but all around.

Deputy Mayor Anderson addressed Mr. Floyds concerns letting him know that all of the Willingboro police are now carrying body camera and that once the budget phase is passed, there will be a presentation done for council and the residents. He also told Mr. Floyd that we will come to the next meeting of the Concern Citizens of Buckingham Park.

Deputy Mayor Anderson also addressed Mr. Johnson's remark about the drones. He told him that there are conversations being held and that the Director of Public Safety is doing research on the matter.

Councilman Walker mentioned that he met a young Willingboro man named James Green who is attending Nebraska University, and who is training for the Olympia. He said that he spoke with Ms. Reva Foster on possibly doing something for this young Willingboro resident. And that maybe at our next meeting in May, a proclamation can be done to honor him. He said that he spoke with Assemblyman Conaway's office and that they too would like to recognize and honor this young man.

Councilman Walker said that it would be a wonderful thing to honor a Willingboro resident at each monthly Council meeting. He said that the Willingboro LED board can be used to highlight those who are honored monthly.

Mayor Campbell, asked Councilman Walker to leave the information on James Green with the Township Clerk and that Council can work on the matter from there.

Councilwoman Jennings also applauded the turnout of residents and thanked them for coming out to the meeting.

Councilwoman Jennings addressed the comment made by Violet White saying that there is an ordinance in place that says that no one can rent a house unless it has been deemed by the Township's Inspection Department to up to par and registered with the Township.

Councilman Holley noted that he had attended a Celebrity Basketball game at JFK in support of the Willingboro Panther Program. He said that the event was given by Willingboro graduate and Grammy nominated music producer, Michael Coleman. He noted that, once again, people from Willingboro are giving back to Willingboro.

Mayor Campbell also acknowledged that there was a full house at the meeting and how happy he was to see that, and looked forward that every meeting being full. He thanked all of council for their remarks. He commended Councilman Walker on setting up a program to recognize the citizens of Willingboro.

Mayor Campbell commended Township Manager Joanne Diggs on the wonderful job that she has done in getting bonds to help pay for the renovation of the Willingboro Firehouse and EMS Services.
