

**Deputy Mayor Anderson** congratulated Councilman Holley, Councilwoman Jennings and Martin Nock on their well ran campaign during the primary elections. He also congratulated the Township Clerk on her tenure.

**Deputy Mayor Anderson** asked Mr. Floyd to please let Council know when he plans to give out the Neighborhood Awards and Council will be more than happy to participate.

**Deputy Mayor Anderson** addressed Mr. Nock's question regarding the robo call location. He said that the robo calls are from the county system not the township's system, therefore, it's based wherever their system location is.

**Deputy Mayor Anderson** also told Mr. Nock that the main reason for the robo call was because the county board of election made an error in adding that Levitt School was a polling place, so the correction needed to be made that the polling place alternate was to be McGinley School.

Deputy Mayor Anderson addressed the question regarding the closing of ShopRite. He stated that the Township Manager and Ms. Foster of the Senior Center came up with an idea that would help to assist our Willingboro seniors with their shopping. On Tuesday s and Thursdays the Senior Bus will transport those who need to shop to ACME Supermarket. The senior will be picked up from the JFK Center at 10 am and 2pm on those two days. Not only will our seniors be transported to ACME, but to Produce Junction, Meat Stop, and of course to their doctors' appointments.

Mayor Campbell once again thanked everyone for coming out to the meeting. He also thanked Council for their remarks.

Mayor Campbell said that as far as residents requesting a change of government, the process is not as easy as it sounds. He noted that of the 566 municipalities that most of them have the same type of government that we have under the Faulkner Act.

Mayor Campbell informed the public that within the next couple weeks he would be holding a Mayor's Forum. He noted that date, time, and place will be advertised in the newspaper.

Ms. Foster asked the Mayor if she could add a statement regarding the transportation of the seniors to ACME. She said not only are they being transported, but that she and the manager spoke to the managers of ACME asking if it was at all possible for them to lower some of their prices. She said that after that conversation there was a significant change in their prices, and that they even supported having a special aisle in the store dedicated to lower priced items.
