- Reliable and forward-looking infrastructure and facilities.



WPD WELCOMES NEW OFFICERS, PREPARES FOR A PRODUCTIVE YEAR



On January 14, 2022, Officer Zaida Claudio #244 graduated from the 51st class of the Cape May County Police Academy and on February 3, 2022 Officer Eduardo Lopez #245 graduated from the 80th class of the Camden County Police Academy. After graduation both officers were assigned to the patrol division and will have to complete a 14-week Field Training Officer Program. Once their training is complete, Officer Claudio and Officer Lopez will officially begin their law enforcement careers.

We are proud to welcome them to the Willingboro Police Department and look forward to having them on board as we serve the residents of Willingboro.

We look forward to welcoming residents once again at our Walk in My Shoes events, an initiative designed to engage residents, increase officer visibility and encourage healthy exercise. This year, the Walk in My Shoes program will be held quarterly on the second Saturday of the month beginning at 10:00 am on the Kennedy Center Track (429 JFK Way). The next event will be held on June 11th.



Applications for our 12th Summer Youth Police Academy will be made available in early spring. Our Youth Police Academy is for high school aged students who are interested in a career in Law Enforcement or Military. Our three-week Monday-Friday program simulates a full-time police academy, running 8 AM - 4 PM. This fall, we are hosting a five-week Citizens Police Academy on Saturdays from 9 AM - 12 PM. We'll cover a range of topics during these courses, including the hiring process, use of force, and criminal and motor vehicle law.

ON-LINE REPORTING OPTIONS

For minor, non-emergency police reports, the Police Department has an online reporting system. In order to file the report you must go to www.willingboropolice.com and click "Online Reporting" in the bar at the top of the page.

Examples of police reports that can be filed online include custody order violations, harassing phone calls, identity theft and lost property.

Prior to filing an on-line report, you will be prompted to answer the following questions:

- Is this an Emergency?
- Did this incident occur within Willingboro Township?
- Are there any known suspects at this time?
- · Is this a matter of record or do you wish to file a criminal complaint?

NOTE: If you wish to file a criminal or traffic complaint with the courts, you must reach out to the Willingboro Police Department in person.


As a non-profit 501(c)3 tax-exempt organization, we are proud to present this opportunity to the Willingboro community. The Willingboro Community Development Corporation (WCDC) originally started out in 1969 as the Community Development Corporation of the Greater Burlington Area. The name was changed in 2017 but the commitment to bring about change in the Willingboro community remains the same.

In 2019 the WCDC competed with three (3) other towns in Burlington County and is pleased to have the opportunity to seek out and listen to the unheard voices of Willingboro, a key priority for the Heart and Soul grant.

Willingboro residents are encouraged to participate and let their voice be heard. The grant has three phases, and is currently in the second phase, which focuses on story gathering.

During the third and final phase, we are required to raise \$25,000 for an endowment to continue the work.



HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FIRE AND EMS DEPT



Out with the old and in with the new - all geared toward servicing the residents of Willingboro in the best possible way! The Willingboro Fire Department recently replaced its 1997 Seagrave 95 ft. Mid-Mount Ladder Truck with a 2021 Pierce 100 ft. Mid-Mount Ladder Truck. In early 2020, a truck committee was formed and tasked with evaluating and recommending the best piece of equipment for the residents, visitors, and employees of Willingboro Township. After months of meetings, demonstrations, and manufacturer reviews, the committee selected Pierce Manufacturing Inc. in Appleton, Wisconsin as the best resource to serve the needs of the Willingboro community.

The new ladder truck is a state-of-the-art apparatus that allows fire department members to have a safer response to incidents and quicker set-up time. It takes less than 90 seconds for this truck to be set-up at a fire scene and be ready to be used depending on the incident. It is 100 ft. in length when fully extended and has a 1,000 lbs. tip load, which means that there can be up to 1,000 lbs. of weight on the platform when removing people from such heights. It has the capability to flow 2,000 gallons of water per minute when firefighting from an any elevation of 100 ft. The cab of the truck has new safety features that no other fire apparatus within the Willingboro fleet currently has. Some of the features include seat belt monitoring system to ensure firefighters are safely buckled into their riding seats, air bags for frontal collision, anti-collision or avoidance system to assist the operator when the potential for an accident could occur, and a more responsive suspension system.

In addition to safety features, equipment storage was considered in the design phases. For example, locations for Rescue Task Force (RTF) and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) equipment are now in the cab area for quick access while responding to critical incidents.

The committee took into consideration the cost of the apparatus when designing and selecting a manufacturer to ensure that Willingboro Township was going to receive a ladder truck that would perform for our current needs and years to come. The Willingboro Fire Department, the truck committee, and Chief Burnett would like to thank the residents and the Willingboro Township Council for their support in the purchase of this much needed apparatus. We look forward to continuing to serve the residents of Willingboro with improved tools and resources.

During the incident, members of the Fire, EMS, and Police Departments were dispatched to a reported house fire, where visible fire and smoke were showing from outside of the home upon arrival. While extinguishing the fire it was noted an adult woman was seen at the window trapped. The combined efforts of the crews on scene rescued the woman successfully which had a positive impact on the outcome of the woman being released from the hospital.

These public servants were commended for their valiant and honorable sacrifice to ensure the safety of the residents of Willingboro.

SAFE WATER MATTERS

Communication and innovation are at the forefront of the Willingboro Municipal Utilities Authority (WMUA) 2022 agenda. As public servants who work, live, and have families here, it is our obligation to ensure the water you receive at your homes, schools, and businesses is safe and reliable. We believe it is imperative to continuously work on earning the trust and confidence of all of our customers. The WMUA is working on a variety of new initiatives for 2022 including the development of new communication tools, upgrading and enhancing our facilities and infrastructure, and supporting our local workforce through new training programs.

As the Covid-19 pandemic unfolded over the course of the last two years, the WMUA was able to quickly adapt by instituting virtual meetings that provided ease of access for meeting participants and staff, thus ensuring a safe environment for all involved. Moving forward, we will continue to enhance this platform, as well as provide broader information through our Meeting Minutes allowing residents, many of whom are unable to attend public meetings, the ability to stay up to date. Additionally, in an effort to further improve communications, we intend to launch a new website and better utilize our social media channels.

At the forefront of our initiatives is improving our water systems and infrastructure. One of the most exciting projects is completing and launching our Smart Meter Program. This project will give customers access to their water usage on an hourly basis via a customer portal. Additionally, we will be installing an activated carbon treatment system, which we anticipate will be on-line by the second quarter of 2023.


Supporting our workforce is paramount to the WMUA. In 2022, we plan to launch a new apprenticeship program for Water Treatment Operators with the support of the New Jersey Department of Labor, while also continuing our annual Summer Superstars Internship program for high school and college students.

LEVERAGING YOUR LOCAL LIBRARY



It's a new year, and the library is offering new and exciting services to our residents! Our new hours are Monday, Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 AM - 8 PM, Wednesday from 9:30 AM - 5 PM , Friday from

12 PM - 5 PM and Saturday from 11 AM - 5 PM. We continue to offer curbside pick-up of requested materials and our meeting rooms are available for community groups. To book a room, please complete the application on our website (www.willingboro.org).

The library provides free Wi-Fi 24-hours a day inside and outside the building. New items for check out include internet hotspots, pre-loaded Kindles for Kids, laptops for lending (coming soon), and iPads for telehealth services (coming soon).

We continue to provide programming, both in-person and virtually. Check the events calendar on our website for upcoming programs.



The library is proud to have a compassionate and dedicated social services coordinator on staff. Social services include: the twice-monthly food pantry, assistance with applications for NJSnap, LiHeap, addiction services, housing, unemployment, social security disability, PAAD, WIC, vaccine scheduling, Medicare/Medicaid inquiries, and BCCAP Childcare.

Our librarians are willing and able to help residents with all manner of questions, including: creating email accounts, job searches, scanning, printing, faxing, tax forms, database searches, resume templates, and notary services.

The library recently won a grant to provide Digital Opportunity for Everyone. We are partnering with RCBC and others to provide jobrelated training and certification. Laptops and hotspots are available for those who need them. If you would like to take advantage of this training, please call the library reference desk for more information.




DPW UPDATE

As you know, the municipality entered into a new solid waste removal contract in May 2021. While we believe that the new contract was in the best interest of the Township, we recognize that the transition came with challenges. For the past nine months, the Department of Public Works (DPW) has worked hard along with other departments in the municipality to address challenges and we will continue to respond to your concerns as best we can.

Many of our residents expressed a need for a second cart. We are pleased to share that an ordinance has passed, authorizing the issuance of a second trash cart to residents that wish to purchase one. The second cart will have a Red Lid to distinguish it as an authorized second cart and is limited to 96 gallons in size. The carts are available at a cost of \$75.00 each. Payments should be remitted to the Finance Office, located in the Municipal Complex, 1 Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive, no later than April 15th. (See flyer for additional information.)

The DPW team has worked diligently to collect leaves before the winter weather kicked in and disposed of over 6500 cubic yards of leaves. During snow events, the team worked hard clearing roads and making travel as easy as possible during the storms.

As we prepare for the spring season, the DPW team will begin cutting grass, planting flowers, maintaining roads, and doing everything possible to treat the Willingboro community with care.



Additional trash carts are now available to residents that wish to purchase one. **The second cart will have a <u>Red</u> Lid** to distinguish it as an authorized second cart and is limited to 96 gallons in size.

If you would like to secure a second, 96-gallon trash cart, the one-time cost is \$75.00. The fee can be paid by check or money order made payable to the TOWNSHIP OF WILLINGBORO and remitted to the Finance office no later than April 15, 2022. Cash payments will also be accepted in person during regular business hours. Limited quantities are available so orders will

be processed on a first-come, first-served basis upon receipt of payment. Please note: Due to production and delivery delays related to Covid-19, delivery times may be significantly affected.

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DID YOU KNOW?

Recently, Willingboro Township implemented an ordinance requiring a video inspection and a certified inspection report from a Master Plumber to determine if private sewer laterals are in satisfactory condition. If it is determined that the sewer lateral needs to be repaired, such repairs MUST be completed prior to the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy and prior to occupancy of the house.

NOTE: Homes without a properly functioning lateral are deemed unfit for human habitation.

A private sewer lateral is the pipe that connects a home's plumbing system to the MUA wastewater collection main pipeline. The lateral is considered the "private" segment when it is located on private property and serves the purposes of an individual, privately owned building. The property owner is responsible for the entire pipe length, including the wye or saddle at the point of connection to the MUA mainline. To protect the public's health and safety, these pipes must be regularly inspected and repaired to maintain their integrity.

Certificate requirements are as follows:

-If No Repairs Needed – A Qualified Plumber will complete the required video inspection and fill out the Private Sewer Lateral Inspection Report. Once the report is completed and submitted, a copy will remain on file with the property files.

-If Repairs Are Needed - The Property Owner should obtain multiple quotes to complete the work, obtain a plumbing permit for work, and complete the sewer lateral repair/replacement work. Once all inspections from the Township Plumbing Inspector and the MUA have been approved, a Certificate of Approval for the work completed will be issued and the Plumber or Property Owner will return a (post repair) Private Sewer Lateral Inspection Report.

The sewer lateral inspection is good for six months. If a property transfers ownership within that time frame, another inspection is not required. If you have any questions or concerns about private sewer laterals, call 609-877-2200, ext. 1165.

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
