REPORT SUMMARY

The Municipal Directors and Department Heads continue to work with other departments and department heads in support of the Township's operations. The team strives to be business enablers, problem solvers, and policy influencers.

FINANCE REPORT

This report outlines revenue generated in the month of June with an accumulative total as of August 26, 2024. It also reflects a summary of expenditures to include, employees' salaries and wages, health insurance costs, Bonds, and wire to Board of Education. The Bill List addresses all purchases made for departments' operational needs, payments to professionals, utilities, etc. See attached all Purchase Orders and descriptions.

REVENUE

Revenue: Revenue generated as of August 26, 2024; totals \$18,849,996.50

\$16,969,194.97 of which was tax revenue and \$1,880,801.53 from other revenue sources. A monthly allotment of \$3,278,118.92 was disbursed to the Willingboro Board of Education and \$2,573,068.95 was disbursed to the county for third quarter taxes.

EXPENDITURES

Expenditures/Appropriations: A total of \$3,941,085.88 was expended as of August 26,2024. Salaries & Wages: \$1,641,890.56 Health Insurance: \$287,922.30 Statutory Expenses: \$59,114.95 Other Expenses (various departments' day to day operational expenses) \$1,227,289.92 Debt Service principal & interest payments \$724,868.15

65% of the total cash appropriations in the budget has been expended.

WILLINGBORO POLICE DEPARTMENT

Current Number of Sworn Officers: 71

Recruit Officer McClain is currently in the Camden County Police Academy and is expected to graduate on December 19, 2024

During the Week of August 19 – August 23 we hosted an Open Mat Training for NJ Law Enforcement Officers for Defensive Tactics. This was open to any NJ Law Enforcement Officer throughout the state who wanted additional defensive tactics training. Our Open Mat training allowed officers who may not have the availability or instructors in their municipalities to get additional training hours and also network with officers from around the state.

During August 26 - 30, we hosted a 5-day Gracie Defensive Tactics Instructor Class. This 5-day instructor certification course meets the newly mandated New Jersey Attorney General's requirements for Defensive Tactics. By hosting this class we were able to re-certify two of our instructors at no cost to the Police Department. We currently have 3 police officers who are trained as instructors and will be adding a 4th by the end of the year.

On August 7 Lt. Bankston and Sgt. Thomas started a14 week Command and Leadership Course given the NJ State Association of Chief of Police. This course was created in 1993 when the NJ State Association of Chiefs of Police traveled to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point to work with the Academy's Department of Behavioral Sciences and Leadership to adapt the West Point model of command and leadership to the needs of law enforcement.

The result of this collaboration is the NJSACOP Command & Leadership Academy, a unique blend of theory and application. Candidates with the greatest leadership potential are selected for this highly competitive program from municipal, county, state, and federal agencies from throughout the region.





Lt. Bankston and Sgt. Thomas are the 3rd and 4th officers from our Department to attend this course. The previous two officers are retired Lieutenant Vetter and Captain Bucs

WILLINGBORO POLICE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Events in August:

During the month of August, Willingboro Police department celebrated Class #14 of the Willingboro Youth Police Academy cadets' graduation. They hosted the last three of five active shooter seminar presentations geared towards members of houses of worship. They are also gearing up for students return to school after Labor Day and anticipate attending many Back to School events throughout the district. As the summer comes to an end we are also wrapping up the Division of Children and Families grant paperwork. We are thankful for the grant and all the opportunities if afforded us to offer the community.

Active Shooter Seminars for Houses of Worship

On Thursdays, August 1, 15, and 29, from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm, the Willingboro Police Department hosted Active Shooter seminars targeting congregation members of houses of worship. Sgt. Barker presented the seminars on August 1 and 29, and Officer James presented the seminars on August 15. Although these seminars were aimed at people attending houses of worship in Willingboro,



people from surrounding communities attended as well. Attendees learned what to do if an active shooter enters their house of worship using the run, hide, fight paradigm.

Youth Police Academy Class #14

On Friday, August 9, at 3:00 pm, members of the Willingboro Police Department, the town council, and parents celebrated our cadets' completion of the Youth Police Academy. Out of the fifteen cadets who graduated, thirteen are from Willingboro, and a few are cadets who are completing the Youth Police Academy for the second time. Two of our first-time cadets attended the department's Moving Forward Mentoring program held earlier this year, and it is rewarding to see them attending YPA.

During the academy, cadets completed ten hours of community service became CPR certified and had an opportunity to have open discussions with law enforcement personnel on municipal, county, state, and federal levels. Cadets were intrigued to learn about the terrorist attacks occurring on September 11, 2001 during our visit to the 9/11 museum in New York City. Although, we remember it clearly, the cadets were not born when the tragic events took place and have only heard about it in history class. We look forward to next year's Youth Police Academy and wish all of Class #14's graduates a successful school year.

National Night Out

On Monday, August 5 the Community Engagement Unit hosted National Night Out at Millcreek Park from 6:00pm-8:00 pm. Most towns celebrate National Night Out on the first Tuesday in August, but our department hosts its' NNO on the day before to give community members an opportunity to enjoy our National Night Out on Monday and surrounding communities' National Night Out events the following day.

At our National Night Out multiple non-profit organizations and agencies set up informational tables displaying their offerings to the community. In addition to informational tables, there was a dunk tank, moon bounce, balloon artist and face painting for the attendees to enjoy. National Night Out, established in 1984, is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie.

Lunch Benefits BBQ

On Thursday, August 15, Willingboro Board of Education hosted a lunch benefits barbeque outside the Country Club Administration building from 4:00-7:00 pm. Sgt. Hankey, Officer Landrum, and Ms. Fodor of the Community Engagement Unit set up an information table. Attendees enjoyed face painting, a puppet show, water ice, ice cream, and food while learning about the eligibility requirements for free and reduced lunch. In addition to entertainment and refreshments, several



organizations offered literature and information and small giveaways to parents and youth in attendance.

Willingboro Police Department-Food Pantry Delivery

On Saturday, August 15, Sgt. Hankey and Sgt. Canales picked up approximately 30 packages of produce and non-perishable food from the South Jersey Food Bank to deliver to Willingboro residents unable to visit the food pantry themselves due to transportation or health reasons. The Willingboro Police Department has provided this food pantry delivery service to food-insecure residents since the onset of the pandemic.

Willingboro Township Back to School Wellness Fair

On Saturday, August 15, Sgt. Hankey and Officer Landrum attended the township's annual Back to School Wellness Fair from 12:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. We set up a table with giveaways bearing the police department's insignia and coloring books.


